

Workforce and Accommodation Strategy released

Our Workforce and Accommodation Strategy outlines how Marinus Link and our contractors will plan for workforce accommodation during construction across Gippsland and North West Tasmania.

The Strategy recognises that Marinus Link will be delivered alongside a number of other major infrastructure and energy projects and sets out the roles and responsibilities of Marinus Link and its delivery partners in monitoring workforce and accommodation requirements.

A key focus is a local-first workforce approach, prioritising local recruitment, training and upskilling opportunities wherever possible. This helps maximise regional employment and reduce the need for temporary workforce accommodation.

The Strategy also includes workforce forecasts to support planning. These figures are estimates and primarily reflect construction workforce requirements, which will vary throughout the project.

Construction preparations gathering pace across our sites

Preparatory activities are continuing across Marinus Link project sites as contractors progress investigations, monitoring and site establishment works ahead of major construction.

At Heybridge in North West Tasmania, where Marinus Link will connect into Tasmania’s electricity network, works underway and planned include noise and dust monitoring, vegetation removal, underground service locating and geotechnical investigations.

At Sandy Point in South Gippsland, site preparations have reached an important milestone with the handover of the shore crossing site from TasVic Greenlink to Prysmian, Marinus Link’s cable supplier and installation contractor. Access roads and a purpose-built hardstand have been completed ahead of future horizontal directional drilling, which will create the pathway for Marinus Link’s cables beneath the coastline and out to sea.

In Hazelwood North in the Latrobe Valley, activity is increasing as preparations continue for the future converter station that will connect Marinus Link to Victoria’s grid. Works include surveying, soil testing, noise and dust monitoring, fencing works and the establishment of a site compound and laydown areas. As works progress, the community may notice temporary traffic management measures and increased vehicle movements, particularly around Tramway Road.

Landholder update

Since our last update in May we’ve continued to work closely with Victorian landholders along the cable route, signing negotiated agreements to access easements on their land and working with our contractors to begin preparatory works at various points along the route.

Through these negotiated agreements we have been able to work with individual landholders to reach an optimal outcome for each, providing certainty for them and the project.

While proactive discussions continue with landholders across the Victorian cable route, we have continued to advance our statutory process under the *Land Acquisition and Compensation Act 1985*.

In late-July we submitted an application to the Victorian Government seeking powers to compulsorily acquire easements where a negotiated outcome cannot be reached.

These powers are commonplace on major infrastructure projects, and may be relied upon in future to provide access to the easements needed to construct Marinus Link. However, our preferred outcome is to reach a negotiated agreement with all landholders and our discussions with landholders yet to sign an option deed remain ongoing.

As we had done throughout the process to date, we will continue to communicate directly with relevant landholders and their representatives as the application progresses. If the application is approved, we will advise affected landholders directly and discuss the available options and next steps.

We acknowledge that discussions about land access can cause concern and disruption and encourage any landholder with any questions to reach out to our team.
